



September is Emergency Preparedness Month



Washington has five active volcanoes, all part of the Cascade Range: Mount Rainier is the tallest peak in the state (14,410 ft), heavily glacier-covered, and considered the most potentially hazardous due to its size, ice, and proximity to communities.

This year marks the 125th anniversary of the Washington State Fair, one of the nation's largest celebrations and a true Pacific Northwest tradition. What began in 1900 as the small Puyallup Valley Fair has grown into a 160-acre festival that draws nearly a million visitors each year.

From 75+ rides and concerts to livestock shows. food halls, and the iconic "Do the Puyallup" stage, the fair continues to blend nostalgia with fresh experiences for everyone..

The 2025 celebration (Aug 29–Sept 21) features a new drone and fireworks spectacular, a 1900-themed food hall, and a packed Columbia Bank Concert Series lineup.

This is more than a fair; it's a gathering place, a link to history, and a reminder that community thrives when people come together to play, eat, and celebrate.

The Rise of Esports in Schools

Esports are transforming student life, offering a new outlet for creativity, competition, and connection. For many who are not drawn to traditional athletics, esports provide a welcoming community that boosts school spirit and participation. These programs also tie directly into STEM and career skills, from computer science and digital literacy to marketing, event planning, and shoutcasting. During the pandemic, esports served as a vital social lifeline, and today they continue to give students an engaging alternative alongside athletics, music and art.

The benefits go even further. Competitive gaming builds problem solving, resilience, and strategic thinking, while structured programs teach digital citizenship, sportsmanship, and teamwork. Students who may be shy or socially anxious often thrive in this space, discovering confidence through leadership roles and presentation opportunities. With more than 8,600 schools across the United States running esports programs and over 200 colleges offering scholarships, opportunities for students are expanding quickly. A study by NASEF found that 83 percent of students reported improved teamwork skills and 71 percent reported stronger problem solving skills through scholastic esports.
